### RENEW YOUR CERTIFICATE ....

The vernal equinox and Spring officially arrived March 20, and we will be venturing back into the boatyards to check, inspect, repair and improve our boats for the coming year. This is always an exciting time as we renew friendships with fellow sailors and prepare for the upcoming season (while keeping the appropriate distance!). As Spring is the season for renewal, it is also the time to renew your certificate.

PHRF-LE is in the midst of the certificate renewal season, with initial emails sent in early February. If you have not received your renewal form, let us know ASAP! The certificates remain at the same \$35.00 as last year when you return it by May 15. After May 15, the fee is \$50.00, so get it in early! If your boat or contact information has changed, simply update the data on the renewal form.

New Renewal Payment Options! You can save a stamp and pay your PHRF renewal by email from your online banking if it offers "Pay with Zelle". 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# **New 'CLUB' Rating Certificate**

The PHRF-LE Class Rule has only four (4) requirements for a Regular Rating Certificate: a) Auxiliary propulsion system, b) Adequate accommodations for cruising, c) Bow Pulpit and Lifelines, and d) Self-bailing cockpit or internal flotation. Owners with boats that are missing one or more of these items that desire a rating certificate will now be issued "C" Club Rating Certificates, updating PHRF-LE Class Rules 10.1.2 and 9.1.1.

PHRF-LE has always tried to accommodate a number of boat designs that do not fit the minimum requirements for a Regular Rating Certificate. We are pleased to announce that the category for these boats will now be called "Club Rating Certificates" in order to encourage these boats to participate in club races. The term "restricted" will no longer be used. PHRF-LE hopes this change in terminology will encourage boats to participate in all of your club-level events that are offered and dispel any concept of exclusion.

The entire PHRF-LE Committee gives our thanks to those who serve on the many race and event committees this year. These volunteers have spent countless hours planning regattas, races and all the activities that go along with them, and have also had to plan for cancellations and multiple contingencies due to the restaurant, business and social restrictions currently in effect.





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Please encourage any boat at your club without a certificate to join PHRF-LE and obtain a certificate. Why does getting a PHRF-LE certificate make sense?

- 1. Your club race organizers can rely on PHRF-LE to assign ratings that are consistent throughout Lake Erie.
- 2. PHRF-LE Certificate ensures fair sailing by verifying each boat competes with sail and rig sizes that have been measured by an impartial 3<sup>rd</sup> party and rated appropriately, and modifications to the boat are reported.
- 3. The boat will be accurately identified. Sometimes even the owners do not know if they have an XYZ-30 with a standard, tall or optional rig, shoal or deep keel, or which production version of the model they have.
- 4. Competitors will not criticize your club volunteers for a boat's rating.
- 5. Owners can appeal the rating.
- 6. If they are a Cruiser, they will be able to easily enter any race that interests them during the season.
- 7. Cruising Credits are only applied through the certificate, not a local race committee.
- 8. Race Organizers can look up current certificate holders by Owner, Club, Sail Number, Handicap or Boat Name on the www.PHRF-LE.org website.
- 9. Certificate holders receive an included subscription to the PHRF-LE Newsletter where your club and your events are promoted throughout Lake Erie.
